





Role Title:	Scenes of Crime Officer Level 2
Rank/Grade:	Sc6-SO1 (Beds), Sc5-6 (Cambs) A4 (Herts) (non-supervisory)
Job Family:	Operational
Reporting to:	Level 3 SOCO
Main purpose of the role:	To attend all scenes of crime and other incidents including major and serious crime to carry out an examination specifically to identify, photograph, collect and record fingerprint and forensic evidence to support the investigation of crime process. To recognise the implications of cognitive bias and to present evidence as required for the benefit of the court  They will also attend post mortem examinations and undertake work in connection with bodies and mortuaries.  To contribute to achieving the Force Policing Priorities.  To contribute to achieving the vision, purpose and values of Bedfordshire Police, Cambridgeshire and Hertfordshire Constabularies.

### **Key Responsibilities**

- Attend and examine crime scenes using scene examination skills and techniques including photography in the identification, recovery and recording of fingerprint marks, DNA material, footwear marks, tool marks, trace evidence or any other forensic evidence type thus maximising the fingerprint and forensic potential from a scene examination. Undertake relevant searches of suspect's premises, home addresses and MV's.
- Understand and apply the requirements of ISO 17020 and FSR Codes of Practice as defined in the Quality Management System and technical documentation.
- Maintain your own continuous professional development in support of achieving ISO competency.
- Develop and follow contamination avoidance and evidence recovery strategies at all scenes of crime
- Uphold the values contained in the Police Code of Ethics and the Forensic Regulator's Code of Practice and Conduct.
- Promote strong working relationships and interaction between scenes of crime and other SSU departments.
- Attend medical examinations of victims and suspects; attend sudden / suspicious deaths and or post
  mortem examinations providing specialist assistance (e.g. Photography and retrieval of appropriate
  forensic specimens/samples) to forensic medical examiners, Home Office Pathologists and the Coroner.
- Forward relevant recovered items to Forensic Service providers and internal departments such as Fingerprint Bureau and Photographic department on a daily basis to ensure crime investigation receives the most timely and effective use of fingerprint and forensic evidence. Forward all intelligence gathered to the appropriate Intelligence Unit in a timely manner. Update all relevant databases maintaining accurate details and records of scene examinations and outcomes. In accordance with defined procedures ensure integrity, security, storage and transport of forensic samples and other materials and to prepare and maintain appropriate documentation and reports to prove or disprove that a crime has been committed.
- Undertake liaison with all personnel, especially those officers investigating serious acquisitive crime, and
  disseminate information to investigating officers and intelligence units to support successful investigations.
  Give technical advice and guidance to all staff in the organisation on scientific unit matters. Provide
  assistance and guidance to investigating officers relating to the creation of a submission to Forensic
  service providers. There will be a requirement on occasions to work additional hours, change shift at short
  notice, work rest days and to participate in an out of hours call out rota to meet operational service delivery.
- Where qualified to carry out Crime Scene Manager duties.

### **Section**

### **Hours**

Full time: 37 hours.

#### **Transport**

# **Obligatory Requirements**

- To fulfil the requirements of the role it is mandatory to provide a DNA and / or fingerprint reference sample for anti-contamination purposes as soon as your employment commences.
- Before commencement of this appointment, this role is subject to medical assessment. For some roles health screening or surveillance may be required on a regular basis, as identified by line manager risk assessments.
- There is a requirement for the role holder to meet the probationary objectives set.
- Must consent to have personal DNA profile and fingerprints placed on Police Elimination databases.
- The role will involve working a pattern covering all seven days of the week and working a shift pattern involving early and late shifts and the post holder will be required to participate in an out of hours on call rota.
- There may be occasions where you are requested to work additional hours, change shift at short notice



and/ or work rest days to meet operational service delivery. Such requests will be managed in accordance with individual force policies.

I work cooperatively with others to get things done, willingly giving help and support to colleagues. I am approachable, and explain things well so that I generate a common understanding. I take the time to get to know others and their perspective in order to build rapport. I treat people with respect as individuals and address their specific needs and concerns. I am open and transparent in my relationships with others. I ensure I am clear and appropriate in my communications.

## We deliver, support and inspire

I take on challenging tasks to help to improve the service continuously and support my colleagues. I understand how my work contributes to the wider police service. I understand it is part of my collective responsibility to deliver efficient services. I take personal responsibility for making sure that I am working effectively to deliver the best service, both individually and with others. I am conscientious in my approach, working hard to provide the best service and to overcome any obstacles that could prevent or hinder delivery. I support the efficient use of resources to create the most value and to deliver the right impact. I keep up to date with changes in internal and external environments. I am a role model for the behaviours I expect to see in others and I act in the best interests of the public and the police service.

### We analyse critically

I recognise the need to think critically about issues. I value the use of analysis and testing in policing. I take in information quickly and accurately. I am able to separate information and decide whether it is irrelevant or relevant and its importance. I solve problems proactively by understanding the reasons behind them, using learning from evidence and my experiences to take action. I refer to procedures and precedents as necessary before making decisions. I weigh up the pros and cons of possible actions, thinking about potential risks and using this thinking to inform our decisions. I recognise gaps and inconsistencies in information and think about the potential implications. I make decisions in alignment with our mission, values and the Code of Ethics.

# We are innovative and open-minded

I demonstrate an openness to changing ideas, perceptions and ways of working. I share suggestions with colleagues, speaking up to help improve existing working methods and practices. I constantly reflect on my own way of working and periodically review processes and procedures to make continuous improvements.
